# juror's statement



As a practicing production potter, it is a singular honor to be invited to spend time at the Archie Bray Foundation as the Voulkos Visiting Artist Fellow, and to jury *Beyond the Brickyard*. I've not been to art school, nor taken any residencies, so it's with a mix of excitement and apprehension that I approach this out-of-the-ordinary interlude in Montana.

Growing up in a family involved with Staffordshire industrial pottery, followed by two apprenticeships, firstly in Michael Cardew's small Cornish workshop, and secondly in Todd Piker's larger Connecticut production workshop, has been an atypical training. My ceramic interests are; style, pedagogy and economics.

We're surrounded by images and information about pots, whether in books, magazines or online — not to mention in our studios, in galleries and in museums. Inevitably, we filter this information through lenses that are the product of our own individual histories and sensibilities. What was our first ceramic imprint? How has fate shaped our preferences — as

students at particular institutions with particular teachers? How has zeitgeist impacted us? How receptive are we to change?

We potters and ceramic artists are autonomous creative individuals capable of sorting out these complicated externalities, and we finesse them to make work that reaches the highest possible aesthetic standards, work that has deep internal resonance and profound cultural force. I see it in the quality of the work in this exhibition. Years of training, thought, practice and pride went into each pot and sculpture in the show. There's a spark in each item, a dream that needed realization, an insight that wouldn't let up. We respond to life's interminable complications and distractions while keeping our aesthetic flames burning. We seek the flash of inspiration to propel us forward and then knuckle down to do the work. We know how to make our little lights shine.


I marvel at the way the ceramic world absorbs new ideas, materials and technologies, splicing them onto our venerable antecedents. Here's a show with 3-D printed ceramics alongside wheel-thrown wood-fired work. Both are good. Here are pots that comment cleverly on our culture, sculptures that are lucid intellectual abstractions, earnest pots that delve deep, witty pots that skewer convention, sly pots that kick you after the fact, pots with juicy colors, pots with extravagant ornamental profusions and sweet little pots whose sole happy purpose is to be used and enjoyed. Each intriguing ceramic avenue can be explored relentlessly; there is wisdom down each, there is beauty to be found, and we are seeking it.

Why?

For the love of doing it, for the love of looking for it and for the love of finding it.


