FrancesSenska 1914–2009



Frances Maude Senska, potter and retired art professor, 95, died peacefully at home on December 25, 2009.

In the fall of 1946 Frances moved to Bozeman to teach art at Montana State

College. She established the ceramic arts program. Some of her former students include Rudy Autio and Peter Voulkos, as well as many generations to follow. Senska taught at Montana State University until 1973, and thereafter she worked out of her pottery studio at home.

Senska helped establish the Archie Bray Foundation for the Ceramic Arts in Helena. She was a director and fellow of the Montana Institute of Arts and an honorary life member of the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts.

Senska never retired from the arts, still throwing pots into her 90s. The last major exhibition of her work was the retrospective *Frances Senska: A Life in Art*, at the Holter Museum of Art in Helena, MT, in 2004.

Senska was the recipient of the 2002 Archie Bray Foundation's Meloy-Stevenson Award of Distinction along with the Montana Governor's Award for Lifetime Achievement in the Arts, the American Craft Council's Fellow Award, and an Honorary Doctorate of Fine Arts degree from Montana State University.

"Frances Senska made an enormous impact on the field of ceramics through her pottery, teaching, and way of life. Due to her vision and encouragement, Voulkos and Autio came to the Bray to work in 1951, which changed the course of ceramics forever and we cannot thank her enough for that."—Steven Young Lee


With recent gifts from foundations and many generous individual donors, the Bray has reached its \$240,000 goal for the Comprehensive Kiln Project Campaign. The project will add six new kilns to the Bray's studios, which will offer one of the most comprehensive and diverse firing facilities in the country. Included in the project are a 109 cubic foot Bailey Sculpture kiln, two Blaauw gas kilns from the Netherlands, and an atmospheric kiln built by Master Kiln Builders, among others.

The new kilns will dramatically improve the Bray's artistic and educational programs by providing access to new firing technologies and expanding the capacity for scale and artistic experimentation. The new kilns were also chosen specifically to make improvements in energy efficiency from older kilns, helping to reduce the Bray's carbon footprint and improve financial stability through reduced energy costs.

Special thanks to the **Treacy Foundation** of Helena which has pledged \$12,000, the **Reinhardt** and Shirley R. Jahn Foundation Trust which has given \$60,000, PPL Montana for \$10,000, Joan and David Lincoln for \$50,000, and the **M.J. Murdock Trust** of Portland, Oregon, which has awarded up to \$100,000 to the project.

2010 petervoulkos visiting artist fellowship

Reflections as the 2010 Voulkos Visiting Artist Fellow by Paul Mathieu

Seeing my name added to the impressive list of previous Voulkos Fellows was at first daunting. This fellowship implies a clear responsibility to respond to such a challenge, to attain the standards set by previous fellows.

I arrived at the Bray for my 20-day stay just before the Sunday set aside for the making of bowls to be donated for a local Empty Bowls fundraising event. This gave me the opportunity to integrate with the community and become a part of the Bray family, so to speak. This was my first visit to the Bray, but I had always been aware, as long as I have done ceramics, of its reputation for excellence. The current residents fulfill that mandate with true professionalism and it was a joy to interact and exchange with them all. I met with each of them, informally for some, to discuss their work and support their practice as best I could. The variety of approaches to ceramics was well represented and offered me a satisfying opportunity to expand on my appreciation for the art. One of my remaining duties will be to write a short essay on each of this year's five fellowship recipients. These will be published in a catalog that will be

produced for the exhibition to celebrate the completion of their awards in August.

On the second weekend of my stay, I led a workshop on critical writing in ceramics "Why Ceramics Matters as Art as Never Before?". There were 12 of us sitting around a table for two days, diligently working on our various and very diverse essays, discussing the results and offering advice. It was a challenge for me, since I had never done such a workshop, but if the others learned as much as I did, it was a certain success. One evening, I gave a public talk on my work and I gather it was enjoyable for all since they didn't seem to want to leave at the end, even after numerous questions and a lengthy discussion.

For the remainder of my stay, I worked in the Voulkos Visiting Artist Studio taking advantage of this precious and continuous amount of time, away from school, the Winter Olympics in Vancouver, and all the distractions of daily life. I reworked a previous clay piece that had not been very successful in the past, thanks to the generosity of Resident Artist Director Steven Lee, who let me use one of his molds for that purpose. I expect my second attempt will be much better than the first. From this piece, I made a simple shell mold so that I could bring the results back with me to my studio to continue later. I also began work on 11 pastel drawings, using all but one of the 12 sheets of paper I had brought with me. Here again, the results will require substantial reworking, but it was most gratifying to be so productive.

The opportunity to interact with the Bray community and the larger world of Helena, Montana during such beautiful, mild yet snow-covered days was also a gift and a pleasure. I was wined and dined continuously and I thank everyone for their hospitality and cooking skills.

In reflection, it may have been somewhat of a stretch for me to fulfill the honor of the Voulkos Fellow at the Archie Bray. Yet, it is also important to recognize the accomplishments of those like myself who may not have completed their contribution to ceramics quite yet. If our senior artists deserve such recognition, which in many cases may not have come yet (and I could name quite a few worthy of the honor), it is also great to become part of such a distinguished group

of legends, even if I still have much to do myself to deserve the title fully. Thank you to all in Helena and at the Bray who have made my stay so fulfilling and so pleasant.
